Meaning Making

Reflections from Pastor Mark

There is no such thing as talent. What they call talent is nothing but the capacity for doing continuous work in the right way. ~ Winslow Homer

In case you didn't read the Constant Contact email or hadn't heard it from others, my last Sunday in the Second Church pulpit will be June 10. I will take a few weeks to regroup and begin interim ministry at Brighton-Allston Congregational Church in July. All this is taking place while the Second Church Pastoral Search Committee is in their second round of interviews with well-qualified candidates, one of whom is likely to be your next pastor. If all goes as planned, you will meet her / him within a couple of weeks of my departure.

I have to admit that I have already begun grieving my losses because of the need to disengage the good folks at Second Church who have called me "pastor" and whom I have loved with my whole being for the last two-plus years. Some of the grief is knowing I cannot have the same relationships with you because the UCC asks pastors to pull back from the congregation so that the new pastor can be your pastor – 100%. To emphasize that reality, on my last Sunday, I will say words with both sadness and with joy: "After today, I will no longer be your pastor."

What this means is that the ways we have connected with visits, frequent phone calls, emails and text messages will cease. I will no longer be the administrator for the church's Facebook page. I will pull back from commenting on your social media posts and generally set firm boundaries. This is not out of spite or lack of concern, but rather so that your next pastor has the same opportunity as I had to serve you and to love you. And so that I can serve my new congregation with the same devotion as I have served Second Church.

I am proud of the work we have done together. When I arrived two years ago, the church was so anxious about the loss of the two pastors and the accompanying fall out in the congregation that you could feel the disquiet in weekly worship services. There is now a sense of peace and unity that is far more prevalent day-to-day and week-to-week. Despite the fact that we developed a vision statement and mission statement that should direct the core of the church's ministries for the next five years, the peacemaking work within the congregation that we have done will be far more important in the long run.

We will have time over the next weeks to discuss other more specific accomplishments. Pat Bonnet and Bubba Sooho, your co-moderators, are helping to coordinate a party for the evening of June 9 when we will have an opportunity to celebrate our shared ministry and to make meaning of the work we have done.

I can tell you now that my deepest sense of gratitude for our time together is that you trusted me enough to be your pastor and then you trusted God enough to let the Spirit whittle away at the collective anxiety. That work sometimes takes a whole generation to work through, but we did it in two years. Imagine all that Second Church will become if you put more trust in God, throw caution to the wind and give things your all because you feel that God had called you to the work. Praise God because that seems to be the direction in which the church is heading.

It has been an honor and privilege to witness this beloved community grounded and growing in faith. It has been a joy to grow with you, personally and professionally. It will be an even greater joy for me to see the ministry bear fruit in the years to come as you continue to grow in Spirit and then reap the rewards by growing in numbers! Your next pastor will be blessed with a refreshed and refreshing congregation who is poised for growth, even as you continue to revitalize the ministries of this beautiful historic church.

Interim Pastorate

The Crossroads process kicked off the current phase of Second Church's ongoing journey of self-discovery three years ago. Pastor Mark has guided us since March, 2016. On June 10, 2018 his time with us comes to an end.

Description:

The Agape Community in Ware, Massachusetts in an intentional lay Catholic community committed to radical nonviolence, eco-theology and organic homesteading, faith and daily prayer, music and celebration, community service, and voluntary simplicity. Each summer, they host a number of student groups for Rural Immersion experiences. During rural immersion, students experience Agape's patterns of prayer and community, assist with various service projects related to sustainability and food justice, and connect nature with spirituality at Agape's beautiful location near the Quabbin Reservoir.
